Lucas Briola, Assistant Professor of Theology at Saint Vincent College, has been hard at work outside the classroom and office. Almost a decade ago, Briola began work on *The Eucharistic Vision of Laudato Si*', his now published book. The Theology Department and Center for Catholic Thought and Culture partnered to host a book launch for Briola on Tuesday, Feb. 28, in the Fred Rogers Center, beginning at 7 p.m.

Jerome Foss, Professor of Political Science and the Center for Catholic Thought, opened the event and introduced Briola to the audience. He was inspired to organize Briola's book launch due to a desire to promote more interdisciplinary dialogue, the sharing of ideas among professors, and "the search for truth."

Much of Briola's inspiration and basis

mon complaints, from students and staff alike, is parking. Many students have received tickets, especially in recent months. Students often complain of the long treks from the lots to the academic buildings or residences and park in other lots that are closer.

Senior integrated science major Amanda Pugliano states her biggest complaint about campus parking is in Lot N, in between the Dupre Science Pavilion and the Carey Student Center.

"I don't think they should ticket Lot N at night because sometimes I am there for a meeting. Also, I know that many students, especially commuters, feel uncomfortable walking around campus at night," Pugliano said.

Like Pugliano, many students who reside in halls like Gerard, *Continued on page 4*

Theology Professor Discusses Newly Published Book

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for the book centers on *Laudato si*', Pope Francis's 2015 social encyclical, and the study of the church (especially as shaped by the Second Vatican Council).

Briola structured his talk using three main topics of his book, which also correspond to three parts of Laudato si'. They are communion and natural/human ecology, the encyclical's assessment of the modern world, and a eucharistic ethos.

"One of the achievements of Vatican II was its recovery of the church as a theological reality. The primary name for this reality is communion," Briola said.

He emphasized integral ecology, a concept Pope Francis discusses in *Laudato si*', which is an "integrated and holistic approach to addressing the global crisis that affects both humanity and the environment". Briola explained that this ecology can be divided into human and natural areas. Human refers to issues pertaining to human life, such as "the protection of the unborn, the preservation of the family", according to Briola. Natural refers to issues pertaining to "flourishing of the natural world, such as the cleanliness of water supply, conservation of forest, and the promotion of biodiversity."

"We need to hear both the cry of the Earth and the cry of the poor together," Briola said.

Briola then discussed the necessity of Laudato si' in the modern world. He noted that the church has been critical of the modern world for much of its own history, and that Vatican II has been viewed as more affirming of the modern world. In support of this narrative, Briola cited affirmations of science and modern aspirations in Gaudium et spes, the Pastoral Constitution on the Church in the Modern World.

Laudato si', according to Briola, has its own reading of modernity. He argued that while it is popular to view Pope Francis as a modern pope, *Laudato si*' is far from modern. Pope Francis argued in the encyclical that the ecological crisis is a "small sign of the ethical, cultural, and spiritual crisis of modernity."

"Pope Francis calls the world to 'leave behind the modern myth of unlimited material progress, and to redefine our notion of progress," Briola said, quoting the pope's encyclical.

The pope, Briola said, does not refer to technological advancements as divinely ordained despite his appreciation for them. Pope Francis is concerned about humanity using technology to "reduce the broader world to an object that one can control and manipulate." According to Briola, the pope offers a scathing critique of the modern world in *Laudato si*' and calls for humility in assessing technological achievement.

Finally, Briola discussed the "eucharistic ethos" of *Laudato si* and another achievement of Vatican II: the reprioritization of liturgy in the church's life. He feels that much of today's Catholic theology comes

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more often from non-theological or ideological foundations, rather than a liturgical one. He explained how the primary purpose of the church is supposed to be to praise and glorify God, and that this is forgotten today despite being a central theme in Vatican II.

Briola argued that the Eucharist shapes *Laudato si*' entirely, in part because it is the only social encyclical to discuss the Eucharist at length. Pope Francis included a large section meditating on the Eucharist and sacraments.

To conclude, Briola argued that Vatican II has had its legacy overshadowed by continuous debates since its conclusion. He said that no council until Vatican II had explicitly asserted that holiness was the goal of the church and hoped that *Laudato si*' and his book would serve this end.

"Our work for justice, our caring for creation, is linked to our eucharistic vocation," Briola said. "A key part of being a Catholic is to celebrate the Eucharist. That demands that we care for creation."

Briola's book, *The Eucharistic Vision of Laudato Si*' is available for purchase at the campus bookstore and other retailers online.

Another troublesome issue is the lack of accessibility. In lots Q and R, there are no disabled parking spots, and it is difficult to enter the residences without traversing steep sets of stairs. Furthermore, the distance from the further lots like S and A may be too difficult to manage for people with certain medical conditions like altered mobility, respiratory disorders, and cardiac disorders, which limit their ability to safely travel the distance.

While all of this may be the case, parking in undesignated lots causes a cascade of other issues that lead to other problems, like lack of available spots and blocking fire lanes. Because of all of these moving parts, Dr. Jeff Mallory, Executive Vice President and Chief Operating Officer of Saint Vincent College, shed some light on the parking issues.

"Currently, we are in the analysis phase, trying to find patterns which change every year," Dr. Mallory said. "There are also bench points of the semester where additional reminders are required to encourage correct parking."

However, the biggest parking issue SVC is worried about is the rise in the fire lane violations in conjunction with the decrease in public safety staff.

Dr. Mallory used Lot N as an example as to why the parking situation on campus is so complex. This particular lot is widely used by five or six entities on campus at one given time, meaning strict management of its access is needed. Furthermore, there are peak times during the day when the lot has a greater volume of cars.

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
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Seeking Solutions for Campus Parking Problems

Bearcats Break Even in Florida

Three years after SVC students were sent home due to the spread of COVID-19, it seems as if most things on campus have returned to their previous, normal states. However, many school organized spring break trips were only able to return this year. The Benedictine Leadership Scholars trip to Rome, McKenna School trip to Germany, and various athletic team trips happened for the first time since before the pandemic. The softball team returned to Florida for some spring ball, with Head Coach Nicole Karr picking up her 300th career win in the sun.

Before the Bearcats arrived in Florida, Coach Karr had amassed 297 wins leading the team. A 2004 SVC graduate and Saint Vincent College Athletic Hall of Famer, Karr has coached the Bearcats since 2007.

"It was great to be able to return to Florida with the team this year after not going for the last 2 years," Karr said. "We had amazing weather and played some good competition."

This year's Bearcat softball roster is made up of only juniors, sophomores, and freshmen, meaning that none of the current athletes have made the trip before. The eight games that SVC played at the Auburndale Softball Complex provided even more novelty, as the Bearcats faced competition from Massachusetts to Minnesota to Illinois. Playing teams that SVC would not

normally face provides variety that allows the Bearcats to prepare for conference play. Sometimes, these teams provide unique challenges.

"One of the teams... half their lineup was lefties, so that's obviously a different take when fielding," Olivia Persin, junior math, computer science, and data science management major, said. Despite the various idiosyncrasies of their opponents, the Bearcats approach every game the same way.

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Softball Goes 4-4 And Karr Gets 300th Win

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"We prepare the same way no matter who we play," Karr stated. "We make sure we focus on what we need to do and come prepared and ready for whoever we play."

Focus is especially crucial in a season that consists of mainly doubleheaders. In Florida, the Bearcats would face a different team in the morning and afternoon, but the regular season will consist of doubleheaders against the same opponent.

The Bearcats picked up two wins against the Rivier Raiders and the Concordia-Morehead Cobbers on March 5. Kiley Meeks, freshman early childhood education major, allowed only six hits and one run in her collegiate debut. This performance would earn her President' Athletic Conference (PAC) Newcomer of the Week honors.

"The first game I pitched in I was a little nervous, but I had great teammates who always picked me up," Meeks explained. "Also, I believed in the girls also on the field so when the other team started hitting I knew my fielders were going to get the out or make some truly amazing plays that stopped the other team from gaining momentum."

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Meeks would finish the week with a 2-1 record and 1.33 ERA that currently ranks second in the PAC, a performance that earned her Bearcat of the Week honors.

On their second day in Florida, the Bearcats fell to the Penn State Brandywine Nittany Lions and the Simmons Sharks. SVC would suffer another loss Tuesday morning against the Bluffton Beavers before a 9-5 victory against the Concordia-Chicago Cougars for Coach Karr's 300th win. Despite this outstanding achievement, the Bearcats were not yet finished. After a day off the Bearcats would split their Thursday games, losing to the Dominican Stars before defeating the Wheaton Thunder in a close game. SVC finished the week with a 4-4 record. Jessica LaPorte, junior marketing major; Alex Dillner, junior education major; and Persin all recorded home runs over the trip. Sophomore education major Allie Prady currently leads the Bearcats in RBIs (6) and batting average (.417).

The eight games that SVC played in Florida provided a strong test for a relatively young team. Coach Karr notes that the Bearcats have a strong and deep roster that is capable of a successful season.

"The biggest keys for the team to succeed this year are solid pitching, good defense and timely hitting," Karr said.

"We have a lot of depth at every position and during the trip, it seemed a different player stepped up in every game. That's a very good sign for the rest of the season."

The Bearcats will play a few more doubleheaders before beginning conference play against the Chatham Cougars on March 25.
