# Home Comes Early with a Win

undreds of alumni bearcats flocked back to Saint Vincent College this year for a Homecoming weekend of class reunions, dorm nostalgia trips, and alumni sports games. It was held noticeably earlier than past years, from Sept. 16 to 18. However, many alumni still roamed the campus with family and old friends, and the stands were packed for the sunny annual football homecoming game on Sept. 17.

This year's game against Thiel College ended with a 24-16 win for SVC. SVC ended the first half 14-8, and maintained their lead for the final score in the end. The game proved to be competitive statistically, with each team averaging 4.2 yards a play. But despite Thiel outnumbering SVC in both total offense yards and plays executed, SVC prevailed. Sophomore running back DJ Gray Jr. held the most yards gained of any SVC offensive player that game, with 118 rushing yards from and 26 passing yards from a single reception. Sophomore defensive back Ethan Facey dominated SVC's defense with nine tackles and one forced fumble recovery.

Even in beginner Spanish classes, her professors incorporated translation into the course, and she loved using translation to improve her knowledge of the language and learn more about

She says that because homecoming falls more than a week after the club fair, Sept. 7, clubs and organizations would not be able to adequately prepare for Fall Family Weekend activities, including the club carnival.

However, Wicks is optimistic about new opportunities due to this schedule change. "This year, with the separation of the two events, we've been able to expand the offerings of Fall Family Weekend and provide an exciting showcase for many of our clubs," Wicks said. Possible expansions to come may include some larger club activities spread throughout the weekend, in addition to the club stands typically seen after the Homecoming game.

After college, Dr. Pitas had the opportunity to travel to Uruguay on a Fulbright Grant where she translated the works of Uruguayan poet Marosa di Giorgio. Dr. Pitas' love for translation and literature fueled her studies at the University of Toronto and she achieved a doctorate in comparative literature. While in Toronto, she also became confident in her skill as a poet and began giving public readings of her work.

Dr. Pitas has continued her writing and translating, and in 2018, her translation of di Giorgio's I Remember Nightfall was shortlisted for the National Translation Award presented by the American Literary Translator's Association. Most recently, Dr. Pitas has worked in translation with Eulalia Books, the small press housed at Saint Vincent. In 2019, Dr. Pitas also published a book of her own poetry, called Things Seen and Unseen, and she has another book called Or/And which is slated to be released in March of 2023.

Dr. Pitas is also passionate about teaching, which stems from the support she received as a child from her own teachers. She was born prematurely and experienced some developmental delays, so she was sent to a special school for children with disabilities before she was able to walk. Those teachers had such a strong positive impact on her that she still remembers them, despite her young age at the time.

Dr. Pitas also remembers her later teachers fondly. She said, "In high school, I had many teachers who really went the extra mile to help me succeed, and they also offered moral support when I was struggling with some family difficulties at home. At Sarah Lawrence, the classes are small and the professors are very approachable and down-to-earth. They made me want to become a teacher myself."

Dr. Pitas first visited Saint Vincent College in 2019 to present her translation of Romina Freschi's book Echo of the Park by Romina Freschi, which was published by Eulalia Books. "I felt an instant connection to the place," she said. "I instinctively imagined myself working here." In spring of 2022, a position to work for the English Department became available, and she jumped at the chance to apply.

"I am very excited to teach in a Catholic college," she said.

"The Benedictine charism of hospitality really resonates with me personally, and the monks clearly work very hard to make Saint Vincent the welcoming community that it is."

"So far, I'm most excited by the enthusiasm and positive attitudes of the students, as well as their kindness," says Dr. Pitas. "I'm really looking forward to accompanying them on their journeys."

The Fred Rogers Scholars is a scholarship program at Saint Vincent College that for many years was only an opportunity for upcoming freshmen with a 3.50 GPA and an essay submission, but now every grade level can apply for the scholarship!

The Fred Rogers Scholars is a merit-based scholar-ship for students who plan to work with children in the future, however, all majors are welcome to apply and join the program. The program offers its participants \$2,500 renewed annually towards their education at Saint Vincent. The Fred Rodger scholars also get to work very closely with the Fred Rodger Institute and archive on campus. The Fred Rogers Institute acts as a museum of Fred Rogers. It houses over 22,000 items relating to Fred Rogers, ranging from puppets in the show to his own iconic cardigans. The Archive is a collection of Fred Rodger's works that the team at the Institute collect and study for a better understanding of Fred Rogers.

"I think that it is great that Saint Vincent College has opened the Fred Rogers Scholars to both freshman and upperclassmen," said Keely Hagofsky, a junior in the Fred Rogers Scholars. "There are people who are deserving and willing to continue Fred's legacy. And those are the types of students the scholars need."

The decision to open the Fred Rogers Scholars to all grades was made between Father Paul Taylor, President of Saint Vincent College, and Dr. Dana Winters, Executive Director of the Fred Rogers Institute, to spread the influence of Fred Rogers to all students.

As Dr. Winters said, the aim of the scholarship program is to provide students with an opportunity to engage more deeply with the life and philosophy of Fred Rogers. To that end, the program strives to harbor a diverse representation of students and fields of study. Opening the Fred Rogers Scholars to every grade level allows for more chances to learn from Fred Rogers and live out his legacy. In Dr. Winters own words, "We are thrilled that we can include more students in these efforts and look forward to continuing to grow the program and opportunities for students to engage with the life and legacy of Fred Rogers."

## East Meets St. Vincent College: Newest Art Exhibit on Campus Hopes to Bring Unity

n Sept. 8, students, faculty members, and art-lovers attended the opening of the newest exhibition at the Verostko Center for the Arts: East Meets West: Women Icon Makers of West Ukraine

Andrew Julo, director for the Verostko Center and curator of the Saint Vincent Art and Heritage Collection, typically picks what will be displayed in the Center, but the curation and background information about this exhibition came from John A. Kohan. Due to the Russian invasion of Ukraine, Kohan thought "East Meets West" was an appropriate title to show unity within a land that is influenced by many cultures. Before focusing on curation, Kohan was a former foreign correspondent to Russia for Time Magazine, and he has an interest in Eastern European art, specifically iconography.

Icons, as Julo explained, " are religious images or holy pictures that people use in worship," and are especially prevalent in Catholicism, specifically in the Byzantine and Orthodox traditions as a means to show reverence towards the person depicted, not the icon itself.

"What makes these icons

different is they are created explicitly by known artists or women," said Julo. "Women have often been excluded from icon-making practices in various Christian traditions. The exhibit essentially focuses our attention on a specific rite within Catholicism known as Ukrainian-Greek Catholicism."

Ukrainian-Greek Catholics follow a more Byzantine liturgy while obeying the Roman Catholic pope for spiritual direction, and each of the artists featured in the exhibit attend an art school in Lviv that specializes in Ukrainian-Greek iconography.

What is interesting about the featured icons in the exhibit is that the artists blend the traditional shape and symbolism of iconography with modern techniques ranging from splashes of color to the layering of paints.

As featured artist Hlafira Shcherbak said, "My art is about feelings and experiences, a dialogue and process of co-creation with viewers in all

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their differences, creating a sense of integrity in the presence of God."

When considering what he hopes viewers will think about as they see the exhibit, Julo said, "A lot of what these artists are doing is a kind of resistance against the domination of Russian control. We definitely wanted to draw attention to the good work being done by artists who are met with the tremendous challenge of being in a nation that's under attack." As a finishing thought, Julo said, "My hope is that people come to this exhibit and think about not only a very particular and fascinating part of Catholicism [...] but also think about this as contemporary, in that these are people whose city is experiencing a tremendous influx of refugees."

## New Athletic and Recreation Center Gets Groundbreaking Ceremony

alking along Bearcat Alley on September 9, one might have noticed twelve shovels with green and gold bows stuck in a shallow pit of dirt. These shovels remained from the ceremonial groundbreaking held to mark the genesis of the Dunlap Family Athletic and Recreation Center. This brand-new facility will begin construction sometime in January or February 2023, and is expected to take twelve to fifteen months to complete. Until then, the short line of dirt removed for the ceremony is all that will mark the future building site.

According to Saint Vincent College Executive Vice President and Chief Operating Officer Dr. Jeff Mallory, a project like this has been in the minds of SVC leadership for several years. "We've had over a dozen different groups come together from student groups to facilities folks to external community stakeholders to say 'Hey, what should we look at with such a facility?"" states Dr. Mallory. These conversations included

topics such as the layout of the building, the equipment that will go inside, and health and nutrition desires.

The groundbreaking ceremony was representative of these different groups, with the participants including **Student Government President Andy** Kunz, members of the SVC Board of Directors and members of the Dunlap family. Student athletes from many different teams were also present. Timothy M. Dunlap, president and CEO of Centimark Corporation was one of several speakers during the ceremony. He later explained that "we've always enjoyed a great relationship with Saint Vincent", which has led his family to continue their support of the college, especially in memory of his late father Edward B. Dunlap Jr.

While certain details of the building are still being determined, facilities will include a healthy cafe, a recreational track around a turf field, a weight room, and private group fitness rooms. These facilities were designed to be accessible for all students rather than for competition; intramural sports and practices may be held in the Dunlap Center, but collegiate level athletic contests will not. The multimillion dollar facility will be funded primarily by private donations and state grants.

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### **Groundbreaking Ceremony**

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Student reactions to the proposal for the Athletic and Recreation Center have been mixed. Joe Bujdos, senior engineering major, declares that "it will be a great addition to our campus and provide the athletes a special place to practice and work out when other locations are not available". Elizabeth Elin, senior theology and english double major, says "I understand that the money may have been 'restricted' for use on the athletic center. But it's hard to watch money keep getting poured into athletics when so many other things at Saint Vincent could be improved".

In the last decade, the construction of the Sis and Herman Dupre Science Pavilion and the renovation of the Latimer Family Library have substantially impacted student life. As construction begins and the Dunlap Family Athletic and Recreation Center takes shape, it will soon become clear whether this new addition to campus will play as large a role in student life as the rest of the campus facilities.



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# Saint Vincent College Athletic Hall of Fame

The Athletic Hall of Fame recognizes former student-athletes and teams who went above and beyond during their time at Saint Vincent, as well as accomplishments post-graduation. Alumni from 1966 to present day are recognized and showcased for their outstanding statistics specific to their sport. Teams also have the opportunity to be recognized for accomplishments during anniversary years.

While the Hall of Fame primarily focuses on outstanding statistics and records, an emphasis on the importance of community and development thrives within the Hall of Fame. This is shown through the recognition individuals receive for the role they played beyond Saint Vincent College.

Dr. Jeff Mallory, Executive Vice President and Chief Operating Officer, had a historic career playing for the school's basketball team, putting up impressive numbers such as 1,580 career points, 313 blocked shots and 854 rebounds over a four year period. Dr. Mallory is thankful to have had the ability to support other teammates throughout his collegiate years at SVC.

He credits part of his success to being surrounded by such an elite group of individuals. Although Dr. Mallory is a standout when it comes to the history of Saint Vincent basketball, he acknowledges the impact students and players participating in other sport teams had on him. In 2022, Saint Vincent College hosted its annual Athletic Hall of Fame anniversary which honored nominees from the past three years. This anniversary was exceptionally notable due to the pandemic's effect on the process. The anniversary served as a reunion to many who were unable to participate for an extended period of time.

The Hall of Fame is known for the many achievements of former student-athletes, and getting recognized shows the best of the best. All the hard work
